## History of Rooster Egg Outlets

2007: Rooster Egg Hunt winner Mr. Richard Waters of Broken Arrow. He found the egg at the Southeast corner of 71st and Garnett on the Welcome to Broken Arrow sign.

2006: The Rooster Egg was found by Mr. Alex Warren. It was located by a light post located on the Southwest Corner of 61<sup>st</sup> and 193<sup>rd</sup> E. Ave.

2005: The Rooster Egg was found by Mr. Keith Lee and family on Saturday morning 5/7/05 at approximately 8:30 A.M. in a tree located in Henshaw Industrial Park at 61st & 145th, behind Holiday Inn.

2004: The brothers-in-law, who credited their family members with helping, discovered the egg May 5 tucked inside a hollow tree a half mile north of 71st Street off 241st Street.

2003: Wheeler, along with buddies Keith Mathews and Keith Lee, discovered the egg taped to the leg of a turnpike sign near the Creek Turnpike/Olive Street intersection -- dashing the hopes of hundreds of other hunters in the process.

2002: The egg was found on a bridge east of Blue Bell Creameries.

2001: The egg was found in Seiling Park.

2000: Over the weekend, Hoffman discovered the valuable egg, worth at least \$2,500 in prizes such as gift certificates, cash and savings bonds, in a culvert just south of the Broken Arrow Public Schools Administration Building, 601 S. Main St.

1999: The egg's nest was located at Lynn Lane Plaza, just south of Houston Street on a tall metal pillar in an abandoned fuse box.

1998: Allen's daughter Kendra, 19, found the egg inside a woman's nylon hanging from a tree in Greenway Industrial Park, near a stop sign at Aspen Avenue and Reno Street.

1997: As of 6:25 p.m. May 2, the Rooster Egg hunt is over. That was the time David Mitchell and his family found the egg in a light fixture at New Orleans Street and Elm Place. The egg had been hidden in the vacant kiosk that formerly housed Photo Pros.

1996: Bruce Wheeler of Broken Arrow found the rooster egg "in a little pine tree in the middle of the courtyard area at The Main Place," he said. "It was wrapped in plastic, and that's what caught my eye."

1995: Rooster Days was one of the biggest news stories in May. The Chamber of Commerce added something new to its annual festival in 1995. A wooden rooster egg was hidden and clues were distributed to help people find it. Nathan Taylor from Tulsa found the egg in Al Graham Park on Lynn Lane Road and received more than \$1,400 in cash and prizes. Jennifer Longmire submitted the name for this year's festival -- Sports Country Rooster -- in another contest. For her efforts she won carnival ride tickets.
